The aim of the workshop was to help stop bullying in schools by empowering children to tackle the problem and learn how to take control of the situation. They talked about the role of the bystander; 5 top tips on how to stop bullies; the definition of bullying and last but not least the demonstration of how people can still be scarred for life.

Bullying is unwanted aggressive behaviour that involves an imbalance of power that is repeated over time. Bullying is not always just performed by the bully but can also be a person who stands by and watches without taking any action.

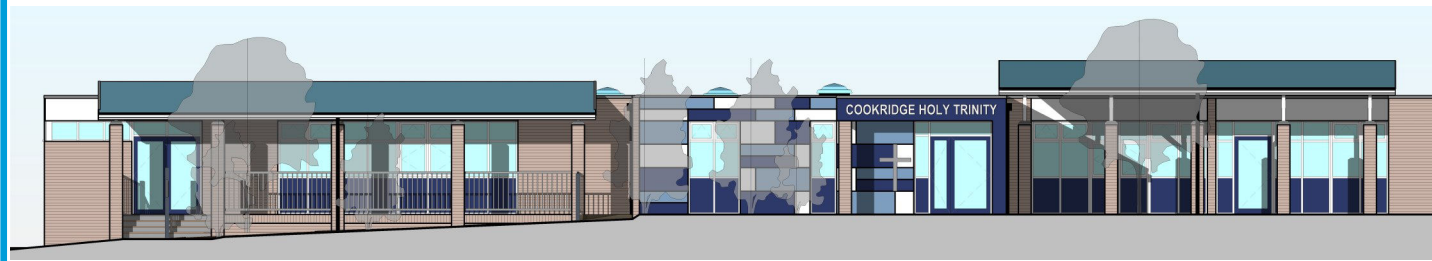

Keep warm this winter with a cup of hot chocolate...!

This simple recipe will taste so much better than standard drinking chocolate and it will be just the thing to cheer you up on a cold, wet day.

Method

Serves 4

Preparation time 5 minutes

Cooking time 4 minutes

Ingredients

100g of good quality plain milk or white chocolate

600ml of milk

A few drops drops of mint, orange or vanilla extract

Squirty cream and marshmallows to decorate (and possibly icing pens and a Candy Cane).

Tools

Grater, whisk and a medium pan.



Grate the chocolate coarsely and place it in the pan with the milk.

Then whisk over a moderate heat for 3-4 minutes.

Stage coach recently unveiled a new badge which you can see in the picture below. They had the old badge for a number of years so decided to change it to make it more exciting.

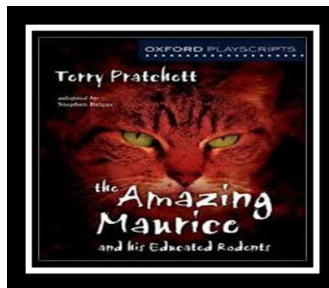

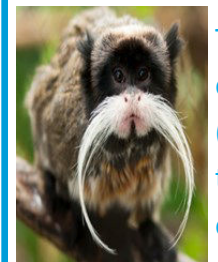
