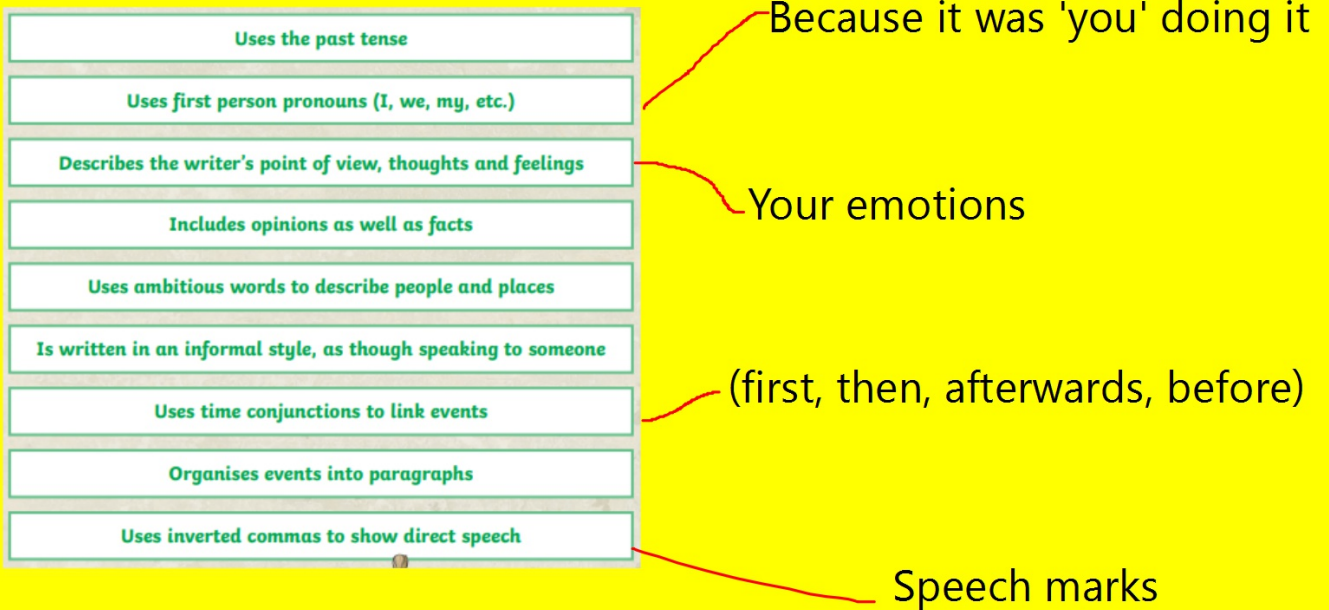
Fill in your own emotions table to chart how the astronaut ***might*** have felt during his voyage into space.

What do we mean by emotive language?

Emotive language is the deliberate choice of words to elicit emotion (usually to influence).

Ideas can be expressed in a way that is positive or negative or welcoming or threatening. It all depends on the words selected. Look at this example:

- The victims were executed in cold blood.

Compare the example above to the one below, which uses non-emotive words.

- The men were killed.

What to remember:

- Uses the past tense
- Uses first person pronouns (I, we, my, etc.)
- Describes the writer's point of view, thoughts and feelings
- Includes opinions as well as facts
- Uses ambitious words to describe people and places
- Is written in an informal style, as though speaking to someone
- Uses time conjunctions to link events
- Organises events into paragraphs
- Uses inverted commas to show direct speech
