same

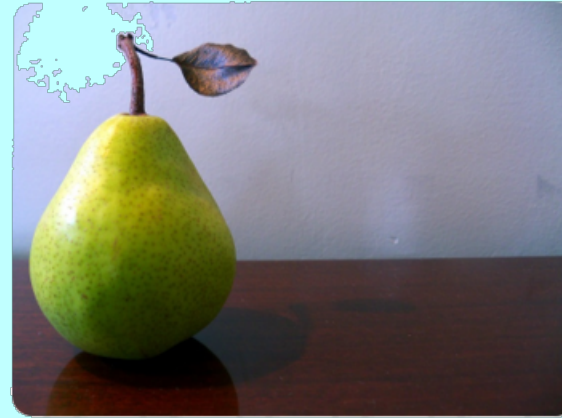

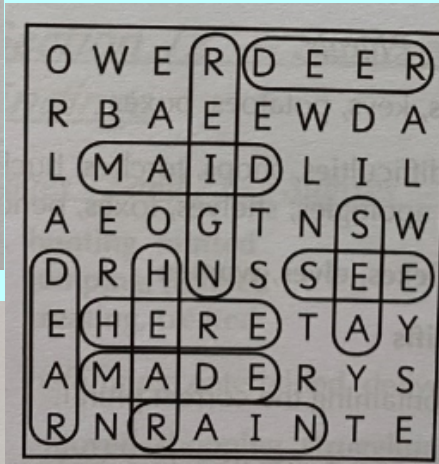
